This is Union Christian Academy's COVID-19 Health and Safety Plan which will serve as the guidelines for our facility's COVID-19 child care activities. This policy was created and developed in consultation of guidance and policy issued by Office of Child Care and Department of Early Learning (OCDEL), Pennsylvania Department of Health (DOH), and comply with the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines.



#### 2). Test-Based Strategy

Individuals who have COVID-19 who have symptoms and were directed to care for themselves at home may discontinue isolation under the following conditions: • Resolution of fever without the use of fever-reducing medications and • Improvement in respiratory symptoms (e.g., cough, shortness of breath), and • Negative COVID-19 test results from at least two consecutive respiratory specimens collected 24 hours or more apart (total of two negative specimens).
